- Conclude with gratitude.

Review and Send

- Watch your self-tape multiple times to check for any issues.
- Save the video in a commonly accepted format like .mp4.
- Name the file professionally, typically using your name and the role (e.g., "JaneDoe_RoleName_SelfTape.mp4").
- Send promptly using a reliable file-sharing service if the file is large.

Understand the Script

Stay Off-Camera, But Be Present

- If multiple takes are needed, ensure your energy remains consistent throughout.
